The reason, of course, is that business is becoming more and more international all the time. Many of our 500 largest U.S. corporations, for instance, earn more than half their profits overseas. Then I'd say, go to school and get a good, broad education, lots of music, fine arts and humanities. If you're into doing news-get your degree in Journalism or History. Otherwise, get one in Business Management. Forget a degree in radio or television except as a minor. Take the classes, but forget the degree: because a doctorate in radio and television would be worthless.




# WPGC Gives White Christmas to Children's Hospital




